P: 212-989-8121 F: 212-989-8230 americareframed.com January 5' 2018 – (New York, NY) – **AGENTS OF CHANGE** looks at a moment in U.S. contemporary history when our nation was caught at the intersection of the Civil Rights, Black Power, and Anti-Vietnam War Movements and the pivotal role of Black student activists at that time who fought to reform American universities.

AGENTS OF CHANGE, the feature documentary by Frank Dawson and Abby Ginzberg will air on Tuesday, February 20, 2018, at 8 p.m. on WORLD Channel (check local listings) as part of as part of the new season of AMERICA REFRAMED, public media's award winning documentary series. Streaming will begin on February 21, 2018 on all station-branded PBS platforms, including PBS.org, worldchannel.org and on PBS apps for iOS, Android, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV and Chromecast.

The film examines the racial conditions on college campuses across the U.S., focusing on two seminal protests: San Francisco State in 1968 and Cornell University in 1969. These protests paved the way for student equity and inclusion, and led to establishing the first Black and Ethnic Studies departments. Today, nearly half a century later, many of the same demands are surfacing in campus protests across the country, revealing how much work remains to be done.

The film captures how students at San Francisco State initiated the longest student strike in U.S. history. The collaborative support of other groups such as members of the faculty, the community-at-large, and the increasingly influential Black Panther Party helped to affect the students' successful outcome.



In addition to curricular changes, the students, who yearned to learn about themselves and their history, demanded increased minority student recruitment and retention, as well as the hiring of minority faculty. Demonstrating student activists faced brutal police assaults and massive arrests unleashed by then-Governor Ronald Reagan. Struggling, not only for themselves but for those generations of students to come, Black, Latino and Asian student groups worked together to form the Third World Liberation Front. Emerging victoriously, their efforts birthed the first College of Ethnic Studies in the nation and ignited similar actions across the country.

At Cornell, a commitment to increasing minority student enrollments escalated tension on the campus. Choosing not to assimilate, Black and Puerto Rican students enacted a series of demonstrations to establish a Black Studies program, to hire minority Professors, and for other improvements that would make their educational experience more relevant to serving the communities from which they came. After seizing the Student Union building on the eve of Parents Weekend, they were attacked by angry Fraternity members, and their unexpected response resulted in a tension filled standoff that would make history.

Linking the past to the present and the present to the past, **AGENTS OF CHANGE** unfolds with compelling contemporary interviews, including the reflections of renowned actor, Danny Glover, who was then a student leader at San Francisco State and part of the movement, and rich archival footage featuring the late Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Malcolm X, Muhammad Ali, James Brown, Julian Bond, Stokely Carmichael and more.

The award-winning documentary features a dynamic original score composed by Patrice Rushen with additional period music by James Brown, Jimi Hendrix, Marvin Gaye and others.
