National TV Broadcast Premiere on AMERICA REFRAMED Tuesday, April 3, 2018 at 8 p.m. on WORLD Channel

Feb. 2, 2018 – (New York, NY) – **MILWAUKEE 53206** offers a rare glimpse into how incarceration impacts family systems as well as the larger community in the ZIP code with the highest rate of incarcerated African American men in the U.S.

MILWAUKEE 53206, the award-winning feature documentary by Keith McQuirter will make its national TV broadcast premiere on Tuesday, April 3, 2018, at 8 p.m. on WORLD Channel <u>(check local listings)</u> as part of the new season of <u>AMERICA REFRAMED</u>, public media's award-winning documentary series. Free streaming will begin on April 4, 2018 on <u>worldchannel.org</u> and all station-branded PBS platforms including <u>PBS.org</u>, and on PBS apps for iOS, Android, Roku, Apple TV, Amazon Fire TV and Chromecast.

MILWAUKEE 53206 introduces viewers to Beverly Walker and her husband, Baron, who served 21 years of incarceration after being trapped in a bureaucratic loop of changing parole laws that have affected his release, and the release of 3,000 other men and women like him who are eligible for parole. Beverly tirelessly advocates for her husband's return home while keeping their children, grandchildren and aging parents together.

Dennis Walton has one goal in life: that his children love him as much as he loved his dad. Yet, as a teenager he made some bad decisions and found himself facing 40 years of imprisonment. Having turned his life around, he finds atonement in giving back to his community by teaching fatherhood classes to incarcerated men at the Milwaukee House of Corrections. Chad Wilson, once a marijuana dealer, served a total of 17 years in the criminal

justice system. Five weeks after his release, he sets out to build a new life for himself, find a job and to make up for lost time with his children.

Caught in a web of imperfect laws, over-sentencing, poverty and unemployment, **MILWAUKEE 53206** renders a portrait of citizens often dehumanized in the media and illuminates, beyond headlines, the nation's moral crisis in facing the mass incarceration that is taking a decimating toll on communities of color in Milwaukee and across the nation.
